






 Lee Gibson (Salem, OR) relocates








Methods to consider

- Mound
- Mulch
- Weed Barrier

Keep in mind

- Irrigation
- Soil pH
- Fertilization

Shallow Roots






Fertilizers

- Nitrogen (+Phosphorous?)
- Avoid nitrate formulations
- Split annual applications
- Organic options work great, but avoid fish emulsions.

Mulches

- Yard debris
- Sawdust
- Weed mat


